#### Duxford Flying Legends July 7/8<sup>th</sup>

all work with one aim and that is to go flying whether in an Evans VP1 or a Spitfire and along the way there are always crossovers between the two. Whilst Flying Legends is acknowledged to be Europe's premier event for the amazing variety of warbirds in amongst the heavy metal sits the more genteel and gentlemanly aerial carriages. Now I have to admit I love all this stuff and Legends is one airshow. usually these days the only airshow I attend to see what surprises are in store and as always there were but from different less publicized routes. This year the highlight was to be the arrival of the P38 Lightning recovered in the 90's from under the Greenland ice cap from where it had force landed along with 5 others and 2 B 17's during a wartime delivery flight but wouldn't you know on this epic flight to the UK some 65 years later it broke down and is having an engine change at this time where.... In Revkjavik so once again its journey has been interrupted although hopefully it will be weeks rather than years. Another star which was there is a survi-

vor from the Pearl Harbour raid in the shape of a P 40 Tomahawk which was actually on charge at that time in 1941 but hangered due to a forced landing some days before but nonetheless a very rare bird indeed . One of the new build Focke Wulf 190 which is at Duxford undergoing some test flying was on display which is being sold as a kit form although it will set you back considerably more than a Rans.

But amongst all these were gems such as the Mew Gull and the Arrow Active together with a Bucker Jungmann wich all gave spirited displays. A Norwegian group flew in with an immaculate DC 3 which complimented the two Junkers 52's which displayed their low speed and highly maneuverable flight envelope. It was also good to see the Shuttleworths Gladiator back in a prewar colour scheme which suits the type so well and when the Fighter Collections own example gets airworthy in the not too distant the sight of a pair will be something to relish.
