Shobdon - Gary Smith

The popularity of summer "wings and wheels" type events feature quite heavily in the flying calendar and Shobdon "summer fair" is no exception. Located on the Welsh border it could not be regarded as "local" but most aeroplanes have the 1:45 endurance required (from Kent), you just have to find the courage to attend.

Three strut members made an early start on Saturday 27th June, routed north of the Heathrow zone, straight over Oxford airport and direct to Shobdon for a trouble free flight to the 15th "Food and Flying Festival". The event grew from a humble food festival in the local town but rapidly expanded beyond the towns facilities. The airport offered a more sizable location which suited everybody and the "Food and Flying Festival" has become tradition, expanding year upon year.

Starting at the east end of the runway - classic cars and motorcycles cover the apron and helicopters offer rides in the background. An entertainment area for children comes next and before the control tower a set of "stationary engines" can be seen puffing away. In front of the clubhouse a shaded bar area entertains the public and fills them with "tummy stuff" on behalf of the aero club. Moving down the line past the main hanger a pair of BA Swallow aircraft stand on the apron with appropriately chosen cars from the era parked alongside, numerous other vintage aircraft are close by. As you enter the display area a sculptor cuts animals from logs with a chainsaw (battery operated!) and the main arena stand in front of you surrounded by perhaps 15 marquees. Having visited most of the food ones (the main reason we go) and observed the other home made produce and items for sale we watched the air display and observed the golf buggies taking people on guided tours of the aircraft on the flight line (if you fly in then you are technically an exhibit).

Note, it is actually open for both days of the weekend.



Heveningham Hall from John Dean

O ne of the delights of the UK Fly-In season is the event at Heveningham Hall in Suffolk which usually takes place in July. The Fly-In is organised by Halesworth Lions Club and forms part of the Heveningham Hall Country Fair. <u>http://www.countryfair.co.uk/</u>.

Heveningham Hall is a Grade 1 listed building in Heveningham, Suffolk. The present house, dating from 1778-80 and incorporating work from an early 18th-century building, was designed by Sir Robert Taylor for Sir Gerald Vanneck, 2nd Baron Huntingfield. It has extensive grounds with sufficient space for a 550m runway *(excellent forward planning, Ed)* as well as a large area for the Country Fair. Much work goes into marking out the runway and erecting a scaffold tower from which ATC is conducted.

Whilst the aerodrome area is separate from the Country Fair, only a very short walk gives pilots and passengers free access to all the other events taking place including Classic Cars and Motor Bikes, Stationary engines, Craft Tent, Food Tent, Log Cutting and many other "Happenings". More than enough to keep you occupied for the whole day.

ATC is in the hands of John Hill and is conducted in a very professional but friendly manner. On Saturday with excellent weather there were about 50 aircraft on the ground so at times the circuit was very busy but never seemed to get frantic. There was a short air display at around 13:30 with the Breitling Wing Walkers and the Twister Duo.

A number of Strut members made it on Saturday but it would have been good to see a few more. Unfortunately, the weather on Sunday was not so good and the number of aircraft visiting was sadly depleted. It really is a good day out & suggest you put it in your diaries for next year!
