Flying, ah flying! Don't we all enjoy our past time whether pilots or passengers we are all flyers with a common interest. Talking of common interest, my chum Simon and I decided on Saturday 14th May to go on a little trip. A little thing, a short flight to the Fly In at Stow Maries which is developing in to a must go destination from the relatively humble and basic operation to save the largely intact surviving World War 1 airfield by Russell Savory and his great band of volunteers. Those of us who have visited before will see a change in the place year on year and in keeping with the time frame the airfield was set up in it now houses a permanent collection of remarkable aircraft as well as the building infrastructure.

The stars of the show for me at least are the superb modern built, but to all intents and purposes next off the production line aircraft, represented by a Sopwith Snipe, Albatros DVa and a BE2 all with original or even more remarkable reverse engineered engines. Several other replicas including a Bleriot, Sopwith Camel and a Morane monoplane complete the line-up.

It was despite a slightly pessimistic forecast not a bad day, the forecast crosswind was not too across at base and pretty much down the runway at Stow Maries so it all made for an uneventful flight. One thing, make sure when changing frequency you let the station you have been talking to know, ask me how I know.

The event was well supported with a number of aircraft flying in and a steady influx of the public by road. Among the stalls the LAA was kind of represented by the Build a Plane project from Grays in Essex. By all accounts they are struggling to maintain interest amongst their peers but there was no doubting the enthusiasm of the two young people we were talking to.

Unfortunately, we were unable to stay for the flying display as we both had to be back and had we stayed our departure would have been after the flying display. Next time we will stay as an Albatros and Snipe in the air, not seen since 1918 is well worth the trip, after all it is only a short flight, a little thing.
