March Strut Meeting

Our March meeting was a rare treat. Despite wintry temperatures and forecasts to match, there was a good attendance at Cobtree to hear Gerry Abrahams' experiences in the Berlin Airlift.

I knew only the basics, so was intrigued to hear about the variety of civil aircraft involved and all the concomitant practical problems. Imagine a busy spell of LAA Rally arrivals, only with greater variety in approach speeds... Gerry flew a Bristol Wayfarer that was one of the Airwork's fleet. They were based at Blackbushe, where maintenance under the same name continues today.

The aeroplane's bulbous nose opening allowed transport of the huge Siemens transformers that needed transport. It was not a capacious machine for crew, however: there was room only for the pilot and R.O. The obstructiveness of the Russians seemed only too pertinent as we considered the current situation in Eastern Europe. We were fascinated by the memories of the hours of operations, together with the off-duty anecdotes.

What the audience wanted to hear as much as this history, though, was his previous experience, dropped in via a passing remark. Gerry was in Bomber Command, flying the somewhat forgotten Stirling and Halifax before taking command of a Lancaster. He survived thirty-one ops, the additional last one made to accompany a new crew, as was the practice.

If you missed this, I suggest you go to the Spitfire Museum at Manston on a day when he is volunteering. It is difficult to believe he is ninety-nine. By the way, he spoke without notes.

It seems wholly inadequate to say thank you for your service, Gerry.

Defunct Kent Airfields

Brenzett, also known as lvychurch.

Alongside the A2070 and bordered by the B2081 and a minor road twixt Brenzett and Ivychurch lies the site of this Second World War landing ground in the heart of the Romney Marsh, where it is extremely flat. The area was selected as an Advanced Landing Ground, along with another three sites in the immediate area (Newchurch, New Romney and Lydd-Midley – not to be confused with the current Lydd Airport). There were initially just two Sommerfield track runways (a light-weight wire mesh prefabricated airfield surface), two blister hangars and a few huts and tents. In September of 1943 Spitfires from Kingsnorth were based there for a few days, but it was apparently largely unused until 1944 when an improvement of the ALGs was undertaken and many improvements were carried out. I can't find out just how much the field was used during the D Day period, but it was much used a little later when the V1 rockets were launched against us.

Aeroplanes from 129, 306 and 315 (Polish) Squadrons were sent to destroy these flying bombs before they could reach our conurbations.

Other operations were, of course, carried out, including long range bomber escort and Operation 'Market Garden' escorting glider combinations and transport aircraft to Arnhem.

The field was returned to agriculture in 1945 and there is now little evidence of its existence. However, see below.








The Romney Marsh Wartime Collection is a lovely little museum sited just a field away from the site of the airfield in a building which was once used by the Women's Land Army. It was their job to produce as much food as possible for the country at a time of great deprivation and rationing.

The collection also incorporates the 'Brenzett Aeronautical Museum Trust' with many relics on display, including aero engines, aircraft cockpits and a 'bouncing bomb'. There are poignant displays of recovered aircraft wreckage, wartime uniforms and equipment and much personal memorabilia. There is also outside, a Vampire T11 which is unfortunately deteriorating, but gives a great opportunity to study its wooden structure.

It is open on Saturdays, Sundays, Mondays and Bank Holidays. It is well worth a visit and there is a very nice pub, 'The Bell' at Ivychurch, just a short distance away, where you can get a great pint and good food (closed for food on Mondays).

Infringement update: Causal factor analysis

Analysis of reports from 2020 identified poor planning and threat and error management as a cause in 62% of infringements while 54% of pilots reported distraction as a factor.
